INTRODUCTION

This set of puzzles was originally presented at the 2008 National Puzzlers' League convention in Denver. Teams of solvers were competing for the job of curator of the Amok Museum of Art by solving puzzles to identify the artists whose works the museum's founder wanted to add to his collection. There was one particular work of art the founder was eager to obtain, and the final two puzzles would identify this work's artist and title respectively.

To solve at home:

- Each puzzle (with the exception of "For the Title") leads to the name—usually the last name—of a well-known artist. Although these puzzles were presented in a predetermined order at the convention, for the most part, you can solve these puzzles in any order. There are a few exceptions, noted below.
- The puzzles have been divided into three separate PDF documents. The bulk of the puzzles are found in the first part (sufferpart1.pdf). You should not view "Patrons" (sufferpart2.pdf) until you've solved as many of the puzzles in the first part as you'd like to. Similarly, you should not view "For the Title" (sufferpart3.pdf) until you've solved "Patrons." These two puzzles will lead you to the name of the artist of the most desired work and the title of the work respectively. "For the Title" is accompanied by a number of pages of works of art by the artists whose names are answers to the rest of the puzzles, so looking at these prematurely will give away the answers to the earlier puzzles.
- You should not solve the puzzle titled "Going Mobile" until you have first solved these four puzzles: "Making Connections," "Paintboxes," "Retouching," and "Yes, But Is It Art?"
- The puzzle titled "It's All in the Details" involves comparing details from paintings with the full paintings. At the convention, large versions of these paintings were posted around the room. For solving at home, you will need to find copies of these paintings online.
- Though the puzzles are designed in color, most of them should be solvable if printed on a black-and-white printer. However, two puzzles require color ("Paintboxes" and "Full Spectrum"), and three others may be harder to solve without color ("It's All in the Details," "Patrons," and "For the Title").

Internet Billionaire Plans a Museum of His Own

"Not Only One Picasso Out There"

Ron Amok gathered billions of dollars with his Internet sites Fiendster.com and krewTube. Now he plans to gather hundreds of the world's most famous works of art in a private museum of his own.

These plans are raising the hackles of the elite of the art world, who are outraged that Mr. Amok intends to snap up famous works by artists including Rubens, Bosch, Hogarth, and Canaletto and install them in his Amok Museum of Art, open only to Mr. Amok and his invited guests.

Thomas Bruchwind, president of the International Society of Fine Art Professionals, expressed an opinion typical of his colleagues: "It's unspeakable. He intends to shut away the greatest works of all times. It's simply criminal." The venerable art

world magazine *Prétentieux* went as far as to call Mr. Amok "an art thief of the first order."

Mr. Amok is aware of his critics and dismisses them. "I really don't know why they're getting so upset. It's not as if there's only one Picasso out there."

Earlier this year, crews outside of Denver finished construction on the massive building that will house Mr. Amok's museum, but only a handful of people have been allowed inside it since then. Those few granted access come from the group of young entrepreneurs, rock stars and supermodels that make up the playboy billionaire's inner circle.

Mr. Amok has already made several high-profile acquisitions, among them Hieronymus Bosch's famous triptych "The Garden of Earthly Delights," purchased from the Prado for the record price of

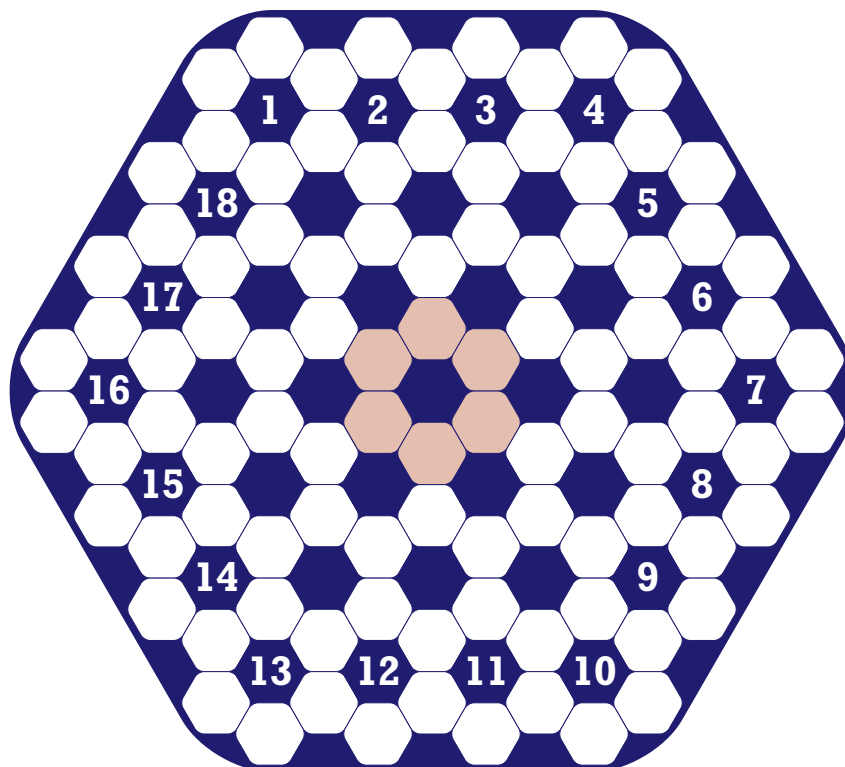

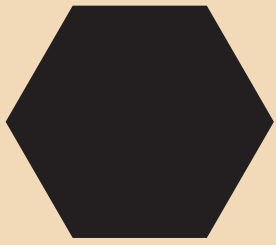

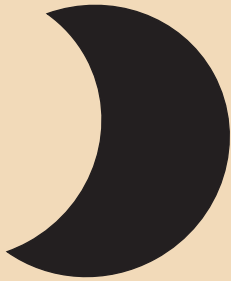

The word reading down the center column of the grid for "Retouching"



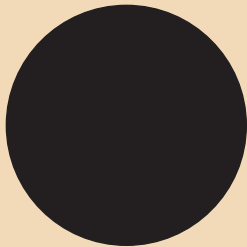
The answer to question 24 in the Seventh Connection in "Making Connections"



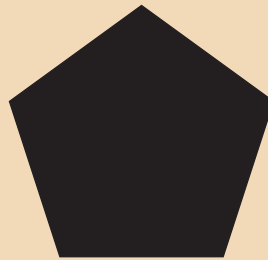
The last word of the clue that leads to the word FRESCO in "Yes, But Is It Art?"



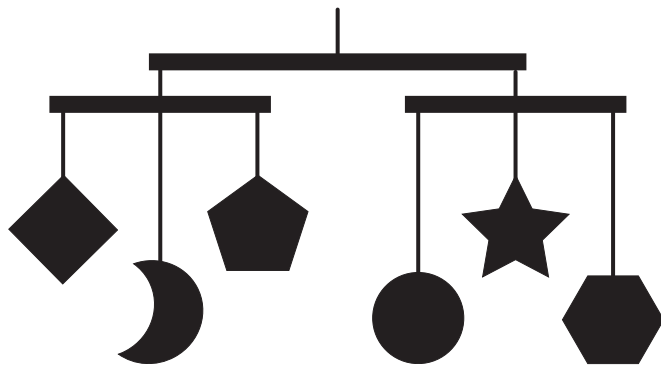
The answer in the lower left grid on "Paintboxes" that is the category of the other four answers in that grid



The artist's last name that is the answer to "Making Connections"



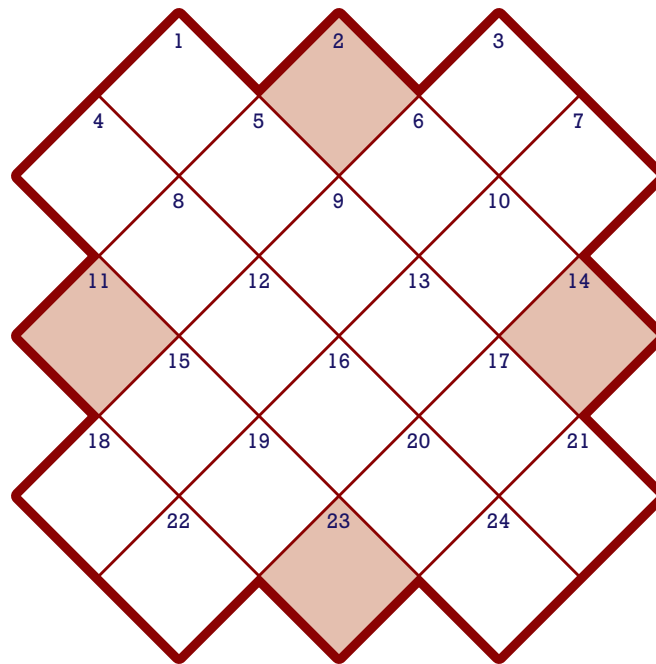

TWO FOR THE SHOW

When correctly filled in, each space in this grid will contain two letters, and each pair of adjoining spaces in the grid will contain a four-letter word made up of the two two-letter chunks in the spaces. Either of the two chunks may come first in each pair, so, for example, the chunk GN could be part of GNAT or SIGN. Clues are given by the sum of the numbers in the two spaces that contain the answer. For example, the four-letter word made up of the chunks in spaces 1 and 4 is given by Clue 5 (1+4). And, for no particular reason, pairs of consecutive clues rhyme. After you've filled in the grid, the two-letter chunks in the four shaded spaces, along with one more letter for you to find, will spell the name of the artist that you seek.

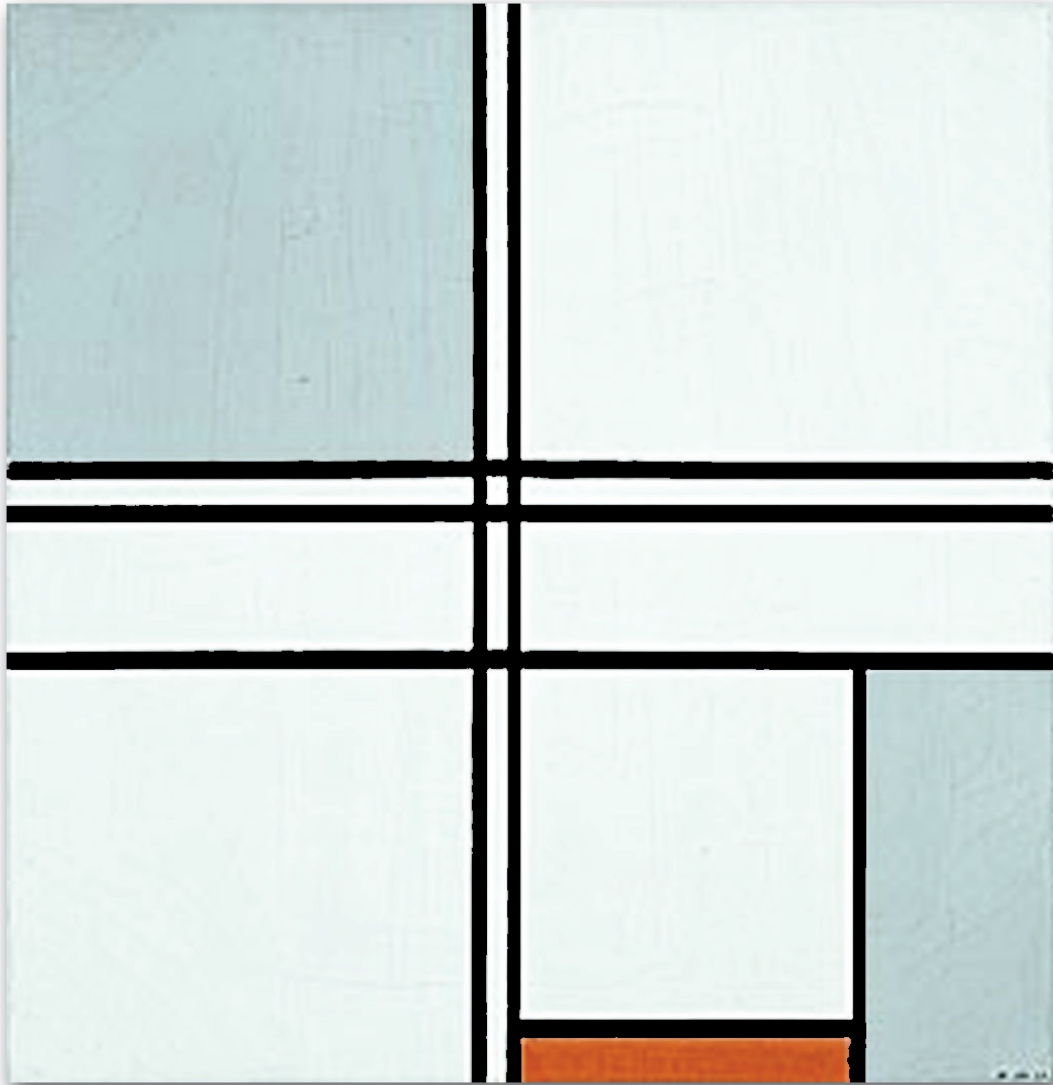

Each word is divided into five one- or two-letter parts, and these five parts are placed in left-to-right order in the columns of the grid, though not all in the same row. You may cross out squares as you use them, because each is used only once. Some letters are not given for two or three of the related words in each grid. When you figure out what letters are missing, fill them in and transfer them to a correspondingly colored square in the center grid. In the final grid, letters will be missing from each of the five words. These letters spell the name of the artist you seek.

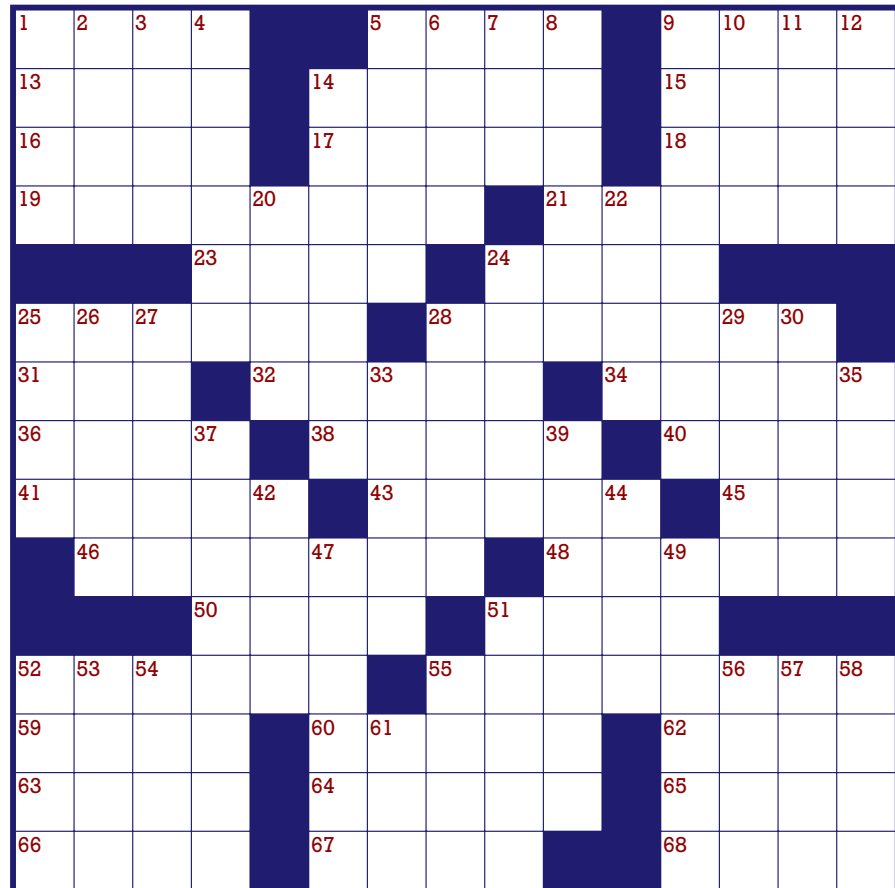

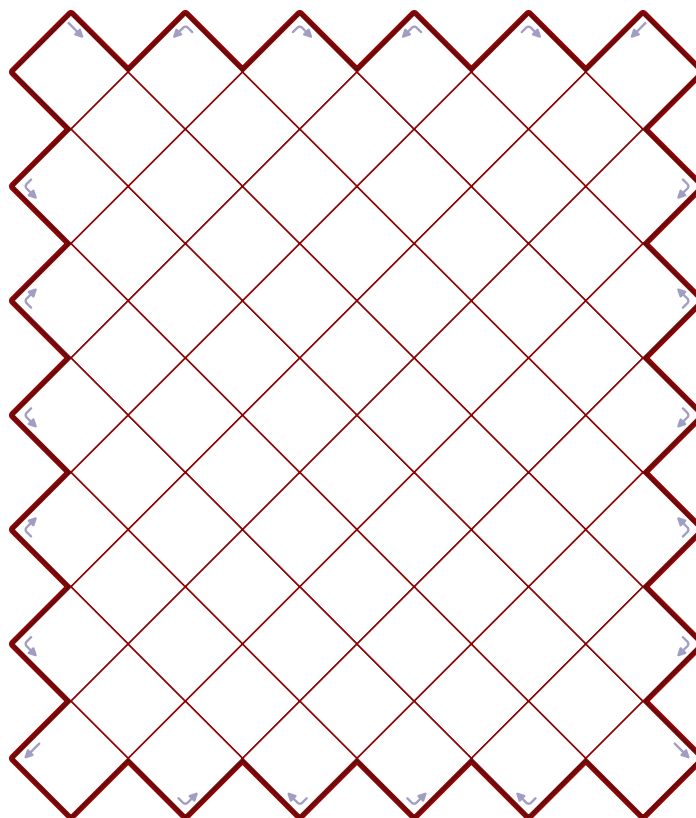

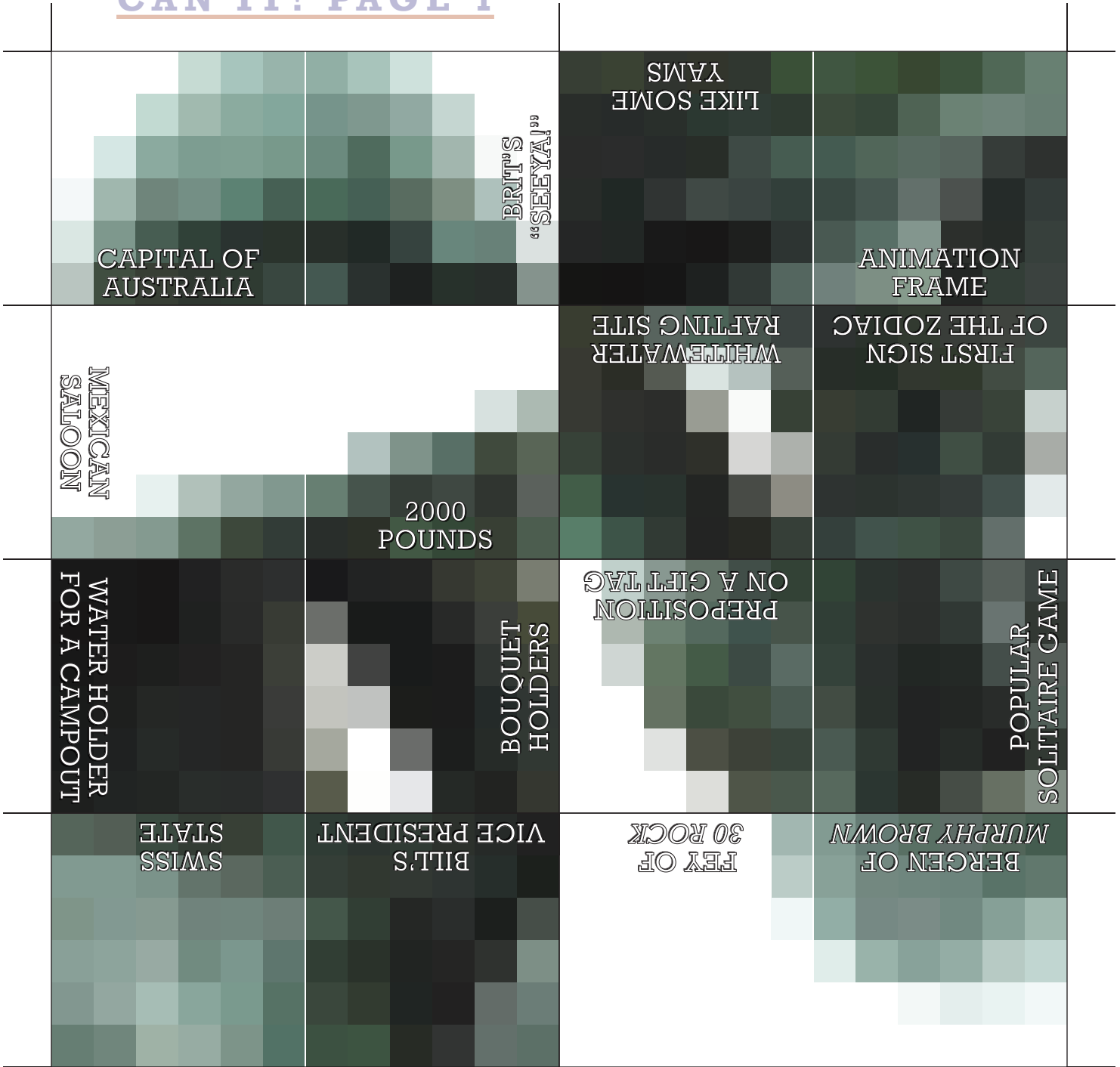

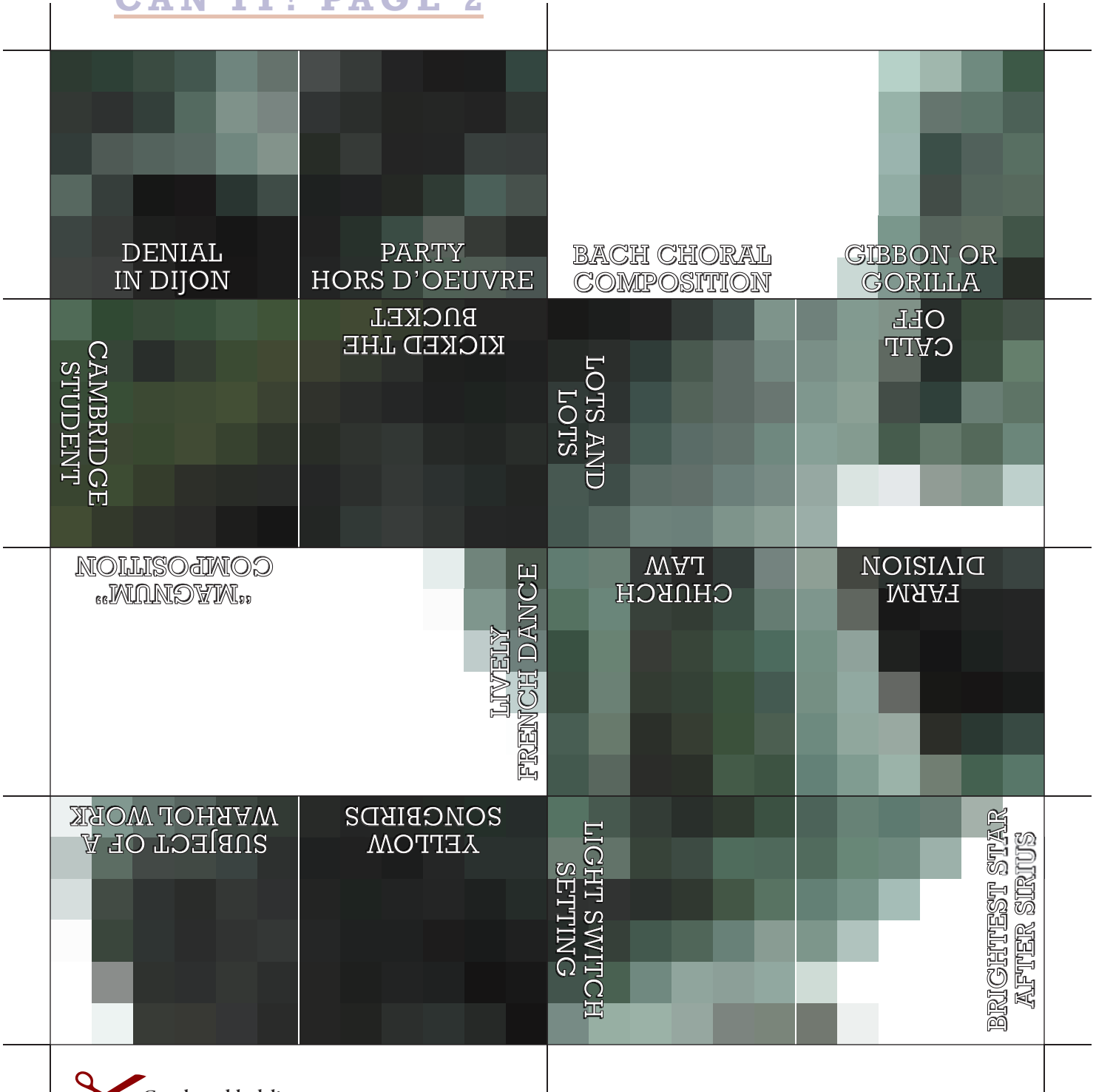
